ENTRY DEADLINE: Online registration ONLY

- Registration period: September 1, 2026 (12:01am) - September 22, 2026 (11:59pm)
- Late Registration Period: September 23, 2026 (12:01am) - September 30, 2026 (11:59pm)
- Late registration will be accepted with an extra fee of \$50, registration will be closed on October 1, 2026 at 12:00am midnight
- The 35th Annual USOMC Competition events may be restricted due to limited capacity. If so, USOMC will give preference to the early entries.
- **If a contestant made a mistake and needs to make changes to their registration form, there will be a service fee of \$20. The last day for any change will be on October 31, 2026.**

ENTRY AGREEMENTS:

- Upon entering the annual United States Open Music Competition, contestants and families agree to assign USOMC the right to use any photographs, video recordings or interview of any USOMC event without compensation.
- **ALL ENTRY FEES ARE NON-REFUNDABLE.** This rule has been established and is not negotiable. There are **NO EXCEPTIONS** to this rule.
- USOMC reserves the right to combine or cancel events for any reason.

VIDEO RECORDING OR PHOTOGRAPHY:

- General photography (using only cellphone, not a regular camera) is permitted **ONLY** if it does not interfere with other attendees. Walking around, making any noise, or using a flashlight are strictly prohibited.
- USOMC staffs reserve the right to intervene if any photography or videography is deemed disruptive during the whole competition. Failure to comply with staff instructions may result in an automatic disqualification.
- For the Prizewinners' Concerts, USOMC shall employ professional videography services. All concert videos will be posted on the USOMC website before the summer of 2027, with free download for all contestants.

JUDGING PROCEDURES for 2027:

- Judges may not listen to contestants' pieces in their entirety, but this will not reflect negatively on the contestants.
- All competition results will be immediately announced at the conclusion of each event.
- Judges' comments will be available to all first-place winners via email by the end of each day (to help prepare them for the Prizewinners' Concerts). Comments for the rest of the contestants will be sent by the end of March, 2027
- **JUDGES' DECISIONS ARE FINAL.** Talking with or contacting the judges before, during, or after the competition(s) is unethical, inappropriate and not allowed. The USOMC board may disqualify any contestant displaying such conduct.

COMPETITION EVENTS OFFERED in 2027:

- There are 100 different events in 2027. From these events, the Official Pre-selected Piano Repertoire includes over 170 works that are new or have not been used since 2022, offering contestants a diverse selection of music, spanning a wide range of musical periods, styles, and levels of difficulty. Additional events featuring own-choice repertoire, include Showcase Piano and Instrumental Solo, Duet, Duo, and Ensemble, Showcase Piano Amateur, Showcase Special (for contestants with disabilities), Piano Concerto, Own Composition, and Pedagogical Event, besides Sight-Reading Solo and Duet for piano.

ESTABLISHMENTS of COMPETITION EVENTS:

- USOMC may divide the events into smaller groups, if there are too many entries for one group.
- If an event has fewer than six entries, USOMC will either cancel or combine it with another event and will take into consideration the level differences between the events.

CASH PRIZES, MEDALS, and AWARDS:

- ALL medals and prizes will be presented at the Prizewinners' Concerts: February 19 - 20, 2027.
- First-place winners will perform their winning pieces at their designated Prizewinners' Concert(s) and will receive Gold Medals and cash prizes.
- Second-place winners will receive Silver Medals; third place winners, Bronze Medals; fourth place winners, Crystal Medals.
- Exceptional performers at the Prizewinners' Concerts will receive an additional 'Outstanding Gold Medalists Award' of Crystal and cash.
- Winners unable to attend the Prizewinners' Concerts may request their medals and certificates sent to them via the "Medal Order Form". The standard fee is \$65 per order, which includes up to four medals and the corresponding certificates. The ordering form will be posted on the official USOMC website (www.usomc.org) from February 22, 2027 - March 21, 2027.
- A "Late Medal Order Form", will be posted from March 22nd, 2027 to March 31st, 2027. There will be a \$15 late fee applied to the order. No further medal or certificate requests will be accepted after March 31st, 2027.
- First Place Winners must notify USOMC if you are unable to attend the Prizewinners' Concerts ASAP. Your medals and certificates can be preordered, but without performing, the prize money cannot be collected.

COMPETITION GUIDELINES:

- For Concertos and Instrumental Events, teachers and parents may not accompany their own students. Violation of this rule will result in disqualification.
- The tutti section for all accompanists, should be kept to a minimum, so the contestants can fully be heard.

*** To celebrate the 35th Anniversary of USOMC, there will be Specially Designed Program books of 2027 with all contestants' names, events and schedules, including numerous pictures of contestants and adjudicators, past and present, highlighting 35 years of USOMC history. RULE No.1 - THREE (3) REQUIREMENTS for “SHOWCASE” Events Only

(1) Prove of Age - REQUIRED for ALL “Showcase: Contestants.

Below is the Age Determination Chart:

- (a) Cut-off date for age accountability is December 31, 2026.
- (b) At time of entry, all **SHOWCASE** contestants are required to upload a “**proof of age**” document (or a copy of their birth certificates).

(2) ORIGINAL MUSIC Required:

- (a) For all Showcase Events (including Instrument Pedagogy)
- (b) Contestants must bring one copy of ORIGINAL MUSIC, or music legally purchased online, PLUS 2 more copies (bought or copied), a total of 3 copies for adjudicators' use during the competitions.
- (c) Number the first measure of each line on all music.
- (d) Without proper music, contestants will be disqualified from competing.

***The above music preparation is for the following 10 Showcase Events:**

(i) Showcase Piano Solo; (ii) Showcase Amateur Piano Solo; (iii) Showcase Special Piano Solo; (iv) Showcase Piano Concerto; (v) Showcase Complete Piano Concerto; (vi) Showcase Piano Ensemble; (vii) Showcase Own Composition; (viii) Showcase Instrumental Solo; (ix) Showcase Instrumental Duet/Ensemble; (x) Instrumental Pedagogy, they may use any music (simplified or not) and they are only required to play one piece.

(3) Showcase Repertoire and Performance Guidelines

- (a) Requirements are two contrasting pieces from different musical eras.
- (b) Repertoire to be used for all showcase events, (other than the Instrumental Pedagogy - for beginners) should be original and NOT simplified.
- (c) Pianists should check carefully not to use any of the preselected pieces from the USOMC repertoire of 2027. If you are using any of them, you can only enter that piece in the designated event.
- (d) With your “Own Choice of Music”, you can choose to play one or more movements from a Sonata, a Suite, or a set of pieces from one composer, if the music is reasonably within the time limit.
- (e) **AT THE TIME OF ENTRY:** SHOWCASE CONTESTANTS must upload a PDF of their complete music scores, (for longer works, contestants need only to upload the first five pages of each piece).
- (f) Showcase Contestants must time each piece honestly and mark it in the entry form.
- (g) Repeats can be used for all Showcase Events, if it is played within the time limit.
- (h) ALL music must be performed from memory, with exception of the Piano and Instrumental Showcase Duet, Duo, and Ensemble events, which do not require memorization.
- (i) To be eligible for the Outstanding Gold Medalists' Awards at the Prizewinners' Concerts, all music must be memorized.

RULE No.2 FOUR (4) REQUIREMENTS for EVERY Contestant(s)

(1) FOR ALL PRIZEWINNERS:

- (a) **There are six different Prizewinners' Concerts on Friday and Saturday, February 19 and 20, 2027.**
- (b) All first-place winners will perform at their designated Prizewinners' Concerts and receive cash awards.
- (c) Additionally, all winners from 1st, 2nd, 3rd, and 4th, places, will receive their medals and certificates at the end of their designated Prizewinners' Concerts. Winners are expected to attend the Prizewinners' Concerts in formal attire.
- (d) All Prizewinners must attend their respective concerts for each event to receive their awards.
- (e) No one is permitted to receive a medal for an absentee. If a winner cannot attend the concert(s), they may request the medal(s) to be mailed to them (with a \$65 shipping and handling fee, paid in advance, online only).
- (f) The Medal Order Forms shall be released after the Competition on the USOMC website on February 22, 2027.

(2) BAROQUE ARTICULATION:

For all Baroque repertoire, it is acceptable to add ornaments and articulations in accordance with Baroque performance traditions, even if they are not marked in the score. Judges will accept the performance of the Baroque era, including appropriate use of ornamentation, phrasing, dynamics, and articulation as historically used by composers such as Bach, Scarlatti, and other Baroque Composers.

(3) PRACTICING facilities will be UNAVAILABLE for 2027:

Practice/warm-up rooms will be unavailable at the competition site. Official pianos in all Competition Halls, as well as any pianos belonging to the Mormon Church, are off-limits to the competitors/public at all times. Contestants will be **disqualified**, if found violating this rule.

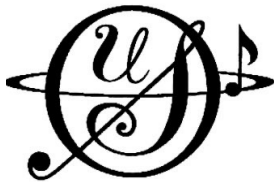
(4) EVENT TIME-LIMITS:

(a) **Note:** There is a difference between “time-limit” for the Competitions and “time-limit” for the Prizewinners' Concerts (**ALL First-Place Winners will perform at one of the Prizewinners' Concerts**): if you are a first place winner, and your piece is longer than the allotted time allowed for the Prizewinners' Concerts, you must adjust your music (with cuts, if necessary) to fit WITHIN the time limit. There will be USOMC official **time-monitors at all six concerts.**

(b) Any First-Place Winner whose performance **exceeds the time limit allowed for the Prizewinners' Concerts** will be disqualified from winning the Outstanding Gold Medalists' Awards to be given at the end of each Prizewinners' Concert.



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RULE No.3 - FOUR (4) REQUIREMENTS for “Open Solo”, “Open Duet”, & “Treasury” Events (Not to be confused with the Showcase Requirements)

(1) PRESELECTED MUSIC

(a) For events with preselected music, **USOMC will provide all the music for the adjudicators.**

(b) **MUSIC EDITION: the stated edition for all the preselected pieces, will be Used by the adjudicators.**

If a contestant is using a different edition, it is advisable to make sure the music is not critically different from the **official edition listed in the syllabus.**

(2) For “Open Solo” and “Treasury” categories, contestants must play the designated music for these events. Any contestant playing a different piece will be disqualified from winning a prize in that category.

(3) MEMORIZATION, REPEATS, & CUTS:

(a) All music must be performed from memory, except for Duet events.

(b) Duet categories do not require memorization. However, if the piece(s) are not memorized at the Prizewinners’ Concerts the contestants will not qualify for the Outstanding Gold Medalists’ Award

(c) **No Repeats are allowed on USOMC pre-selected music, unless instructed to do so in this syllabus.**

(d) **For longer pieces, follow the USOMC instruction for “Cuts” carefully; it is important not to make any mistakes with the Cuts.**

(4) In 2027, USOMC has Newly added:

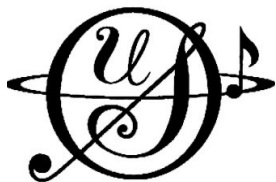
(a) **3 Preparatory events with 12 different pieces; (a) in the Open Solo category; (b) in the Treasury 20th-21st Century category and (c) in the Open Duet Romantic and Contemporary category.** (This is especially created for the youngest contestants to introduce them to classical music and a chance to enjoy the excitement of performing before an audience. We hope this will be a beautiful beginning for some bright and promising young musicians).

(a) There are 3 events for the American composer, Scott Joplin’s works selected for the Open Solos 4C, 5C, and The Treasury of Romantic Intermediate Category.

(b) Five prominent Composers have been in the Treasury events: Albéniz, Bartok, Ibert, MacDowell, and Tansman.

**SHOWCASE PIANO ADJUDICATOR CONCERT AND MASTERCLASS WILL BE
TENTATIVELY SCHEDULED FOR FEBRUARY 21st, 2027.**

The location is to be determined. This event will also be free and open to the public, offering a unique opportunity to experience performances and insights from our distinguished adjudicator. The piano masterclass will feature three of the top 1st Place Winners chosen among all the Showcase Piano Solo events to participate in the masterclass. There will also be 2 alternate winners for the Masterclass.

We are pleased to announce Six Prize Winners Concerts, tentatively scheduled for Friday, February 19th, 2027, and Saturday, February 20th, 2027, to be held at the ISC Auditorium.

These concerts will be free and open to the public, showcasing the First Place Winners from each competition event. A professional videographer will be recording all Prize Winners Concerts, and will be made available, free of charge online in June.

CATEGORY 1: OPEN SOLO - NO AGE LIMIT

- There are Six levels - four categories each - a total of 24 Events. All contestants perform the same music in each event.
- The 24 pieces are pre-selected. Contestants may enter numerous events as they choose. Please review P.3-P.5 before making your selection.

Note NO REPEATS are allowed, unless clearly instructed to do so.

For all Baroque music; guidelines will be given to judges concerning “commonly known” baroque performance practices regarding ornaments, phrasing, dynamics and articulations not marked as such, but used by Bach, Scarlatti, Handel, and other Baroque composers and musicians as appropriate styles for that period. Judges will not penalize the contestants for such Baroque articulations.

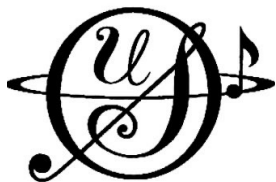

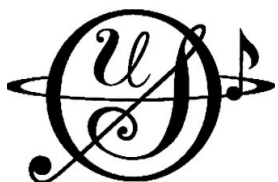

- **Contestants who have won first place at the USOMC in the past are not allowed to enter again using the same repertoire. If they do, they will be automatically disqualified to win a prize.**

The time limit for the competition is ten (10) minutes and the Prizewinners’ Concerts is five (5) minutes.

CATEGORY 13: SHOWCASE SPECIAL PIANO SOLO

This event is intended to give musical opportunities to contestants with special physical or intellectual disabilities, such as blindness, and other disabilities, including autism. All contestants with special needs are welcome to enter this event, without age limits. They may choose music from any standard repertoire. Performance from memory is required. The time limit for the competition and the Prizewinners’ Concert are the same, is five (5) minutes.

- To promote broader repertory knowledge, contestants who have won first place at the USOMC in the past are not allowed to enter again using the same movement of the Concerto. If they do, they will be disqualified to win a prize unless it is used as a part of the Complete Concerto in Category 15.
- Performance must be from memory.
- Contestants must upload at registration, a PDF of their complete music scores (or first five pages of the movement).
- **Contestants are required to bring their own accompanist for the competition. Teachers or Parents are not allowed to accompany their own students.**
- **Contestants must time their concerto movement accurately and mark it clearly on the Entry form. Please carefully review the Competition Rules on P.3-P.4.**
- The judges may not hear the entire movement. This will not reflect negatively on the contestants.
- Contestants must bring 3 copies of their music (one must be purchased) for the judges during the competition and mark the first bar of each line. Without proper music, contestants will be disqualified.
- First Place Winners should be prepared to shorten their concerto movements (if necessary) at the Prizewinners Concerts.

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CATEGORY 15: COMPLETE PIANO CONCERTO - NO AGE LIMIT

The event is for the exceptionally gifted

- Any complete concerto from the standard piano repertoire may be used. To promote broader repertory knowledge, contestants who have won first place in this event at the USOMC in the past, are not allowed to enter again, using the same concerto. If they do, they will be disqualified to win a prize.
- Performance of the entire concerto must be from memory.
- **Contestants are require to bring their own accompanist for the competition. Teachers and/or Parents are not allowed to accompany their own students.**
- Please time the concerto accurately and mark the time clearly on the Entry form. The complete Concerto may be longer than 30 minutes, but each contestant is given a maximum time of 25 minutes for the competition. The judges may hear portions of the entire Concerto as they see fit. This will not reflect negatively on the contestants.
- **Please carefully review the Competition Rules on P.3 to P.4.**
- Contestant must upload at registration, a PDF of their complete music scores (or first five page of each movement) of EACH MOVEMENT.
- Contestant must bring 3 copies of their music (one must be purchased) for the judges during the competition and mark the first bar of each line. Without proper music, contestants will be disqualified.
- The First Place Winner is allowed a maximum of 12 minutes for the performance at the Prizewinners' Concert. Please make sensible cuts to fit the given time.

CATEGORY 16: SHOWCASE SIGHT-READING SOLO

- **There are Different Age Groups in this Category.**
- All contestants will play “by sight” one short piece appropriate for their age level.
- Level Preparatory and Elementary will have five minutes to look over the music (without a piano) before their turn to play.
- Level Junior through Senior will have three minutes to look over the music (without a piano) before their turn to play.
- Each contestant may enter only once in the Solo Event.
- **Contestants may count audibly while playing at the competition.**

- Contestants may enter only once with partner(s) from the proper age group. The older partner’s age will determine the age group.
- **Contestants may count audibly while playing at the competition.**
- Among all the duet sight-reading events, one team will be chosen to perform a new piece at the Prize Winners’ Concert.

If USOMC does not receive a score or email requesting an extension, the contestant will be disqualified.
- Contestants must bring 3 copies of their music for the judges during the competition.

CATEGORY 19: PREPARATORY INSTRUMENTAL PEDAGOGY

The **Preparatory Instrumental Pedagogy** event is designed to encourage our youngest instrumentalists to develop confidence, embrace their musical talents, and enjoy the experience of performing in a supportive and welcoming environment.

- This event is for instrumental students in ages 8 and under.
- Contestants can choose any music that is under 2 minutes, including simplified versions of the music.
- Performance will be without an accompanist. Memorization is required.
- Contestants must bring 3 copies of their music for the judges during the competition.

For ALL Instrumental Events: due to the diverse variations of different musical instruments in these events, USOMC Competition Committee reserves the right to choose the combination of Instruments for each event.

CATEGORY 20: SHOWCASE INSTRUMENTAL SOLO

There are Four Different Age Groups in this Category.

- Contestants must select two original and contrasting pieces (with or without piano accompaniment) from different musical periods. ANY STANDARD REPERTOIRE will be acceptable, such as one or more movements from a Sonata, Concerto, Suite, or Theme & Variation. **No Simplified Music Allowed.** Performance must be from memory. **Contestants must be prepared to play their music entirely (without personal ‘cuts’).** The judges may begin or stop a performance at a certain point, neither of which will reflect negatively on the contestants.
- **Accompanist: If the contestant’s music calls for a piano accompaniment, they are responsible to bring their own accompanist for the competition. Teachers or Parents are not allowed to accompany their own student.**
- Contestants must upload at registration, a PDF of their complete music scores (or first five pages of each piece).
- Contestants who have won first-place at the USOMC in the past, are not allowed to enter again using the same repertoire! If they do, they will be disqualified to win a prize.
- USOMC reserves the right to combine or cancel events that do not have an adequate number of entries.
- Contestants must bring 3 copies of their music (one must be purchased) for the judges during the competition and mark the first bar of each line. Without proper music, contestants will be disqualified.
- Please review the Competition rules on P.3-P.4.
- The adjudicators will choose the piece for the First-Place winners to play at the Prizewinners’ Concert. Please check carefully for the maximum time allowed for the **Prizewinners’ Concerts** (cuts may be necessary to fit into the time limit).

- **The Instrumental Sonatas include two (2) performers (any combination of instruments), with or without a piano part. All contestants will be judged. If a piano part is required, the pianist will be judged as a part of the duet.**
- Contestants may choose one or more movements (within the time limit) by one composer from any standard repertoire.
- Memorization is not required. Note* If the music is not memorized at the Prizewinners' Concerts, the contestants cannot be considered for the Outstanding Gold Medalists' Awards.
- Time the pieces accurately and mark them clearly on the Entry form.
- Please carefully review the Competition Rules on P.3-P.4.
- Contestants must upload at registration, a PDF of their complete music scores (or the first five (5) pages of each piece).
- The judges may not hear the pieces in their entirety. This will not reflect negatively on the contestants.

- Time the pieces accurately and mark them clearly on the Entry form. Please review the Competition on P.3-P.4.
- Contestants must upload at registration, a PDF of their complete music scores (or the first five pages of each piece).
- The judges may not hear the pieces in their entirety. This will not reflect negatively on the contestants.
- Contestants must bring at 3 copies of their music (one must be purchased) for the judges during the competition and mark the first bar of each line. Without proper music, contestants will be disqualified.
